



TORONTO'S FIRST LABOUR DAY

1882

"It is estimated that the demonstration of the Trades and Labour Council Saturday was witnessed by 50,000 people. Its success was even greater than anticipated and was pronounced by those who have witnessed similar processions in Great Britain to be equal to anything they had ever seen. Between three and four thousand men took part in it, and that the demonstration was undoubtedly popular was evident from the thousands of both sexes and all ages who viewed the line of march.

As was natural, the wives, sisters, and daughters of those in the procession were all eager to view the parade, and their presence on the streets in thousands was a feature of the day to the observant. ...

As the procession closed, one could not help admiring it as a demonstration most successful, considering that it is the first of its kind. ... The workingmen are certainly to be congratulated upon the result of their efforts. A pleasing feature was the fraternizing of Union and Non-Union men."
